#### **Connecting the Present with the Past**

Beverly Schumacher, a volunteer genealogist for the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and Sons of the American Revolution SAR), and President of the local Athens County Genealogical chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society, spoke at the September Shade-Lodi History and Genealogy Association meeting at the Shade Community Center.

She discussed each of the organizations and invited anyone who is a direct blood descendant to make an application. Even those who made patriotic speeches, made cannon balls, sewed a flag, or made a patriotic speech are eligible ancestors.

By definition the DAR is a service organization which emphasizes, "historic, educational and patriotic purposes ...to make America a better place in which to live." The first objective of the DAR is "to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American independence."

The organization assists in historic preservation, preserving important documents and records of the past. They support schools throughout the United States with scholarships and funding. The local chapter is the Nabby Lee Ames Chapter organized in Athens in 1903.

The SAR is a non-profit heritage society dedicated to, "historical, educational, and patriotic" principles. Some of the organization's purposes are to "maintain the institutions of American freedom, respect national symbols, and the unifying force of *e pluribus unum* that has created, from the people of many nations, one nation and one people." The local chapter is the Ewing Chapter.

#### **Manuel Grueser: From Coalmine to Farm**

Manuel Grueser, retired coal miner and beef farmer, recently spoke to the Shade-Lodi History group about his underground mining experience. He also shared a video depicting the coal mine where he worked. Coal mining is an example of the many interesting topics enjoyed by those who attend the monthly Tuesday evening meetings.

The fossil fuel coal was found in southern Ohio by settlers as early as 1748 and the first underground coal production dated back to 1800.

There was also mining on the surface of a hillside. Long Run Road, Lodi township, was the site of a surface mine. Another mining site was close to Bartlett Road. Coal was mined using picks and shovels, loaded onto wagons pulled by mules or ponies, and carried to the coal tipple for shipment.

At the corner of Fossil Rock Road and Sargent Road, a coal tipple once stood. (cont. p. 5)

the St. John's Church (est.1861) in Anthony.
St. John's is believed to be the oldest Catholic
Church in Athens County. Many German
families, including Schuler, Kenkoskia,

Staab, Niggemeyer, Kinnen, Josten, Warner, Klingenberg, came to Lodi township by way of Pomeroy. The church burned to the ground March, 1965. A new building was dedicated in 1967.

The industry has come a long way since those days. Manuel's audience was shocked when told he had to go underground 350 feet just to get to work! He explained long wall mining with the continuous operating machine was the type of mining operation he worked in. The seam of coal was sheared from the face of the wall, the coal dropped onto a very large conveyor belt and carried out of the mine. Once it was out, it was removed to a preparation plant for removal of some sulfur and extracted rock.

It is not uncommon that any subject chosen for our meetings, to be interjected with comments about how 'it' was done in the good old days. Carbide lights became the conversation sub-

ject. Shirley Webb remembered her father's light. Of course then she wondered where it was. Carbide lamps or acetylene gas lamps were used in mines to illuminate a totally dark tunnel. Acetylene gas was formed when calcium carbide and water reacted with each other. The gas goes to the top of a chamber, out a tube to a burner tip. The tip was lit with a flint. But, there was always the risk of explosion.

Manuel was confronted daily with the dangerousness of his occupation. One of the stories he told was about a day he will never forget. A fire ball 6 to 8 feet in diameter flew toward he and his fellow worker, burning Manuel's ears and the other fellow body so badly he required skin grafts.

# Alternative Energy Source heard on NPR

The 2009 edition of the Old Farmer's Almanac is predicting a colder winter and includes advice on how to use wood to heat your home. In addition to tips on the best wood and how to build a fire, there's also a trick for staying warm all winter long with a single log.

The method was popularized in 1777. It involved throwing a log out an upstairs window, dashing downstairs, retrieving the log, dashing upstairs, throwing the log out the window again and again and again. Editor Janice Stillman says do that until you work up a sweat and you'll be warm all winter on a single log.

## The Cook's Corner

#### **Henderson Easy Fruit Cobbler**

#### from Roberta Henderson

2 qt. Frozen or canned fruit

 $1\ \%$  cup sugar or Splenda to sweeten – varies by fruit

3-4 Tbsp flour to thicken

Combine and put in bottom of 9x13" pan

#### Topping for cobbler

1 ½ cup flour

 $\frac{3}{4}$  cup sugar

 $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp salt

2 tsp baking powder

34 cup milk

1 tsp vanilla

1/4 cup melted shortening

1 egg

Combine and pour over fruit. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes or until brown.

## Breakfast Casserole

1 lb bag Shredded Hash Browns

1 lb bulk Sausage (browned, drained, cooled)

 $1\ 1/2$  to  $2\ {\rm cups}$  of Sharp Cheddar Cheese

10 to 12 Eggs (beaten)

1 pkg (2.64oz.) Country Gravy Mix (like McCormicks)

Spray 9 X 13 baking dish lightly with cooking spray or butter. Mix hash browns, sausage and half of the cheese together. Spread mixed ingredients into the 9 X 13 pan. Pour beaten eggs over ingredients in pan. Bake at 375 degrees about 40 minutes - until eggs are set and casserole is browned. Prepare gravy mix according to package directions. Top casserole with the gravy and remaining cheese. Bake another 5 minutes or so until cheese is melted.

This recipe was given to me by Tiffany Holt. She worked with me at McBee Systems. It was one of our favorite casserole when we had food day. Food day was more often as it got closer to the plant closing.

(Note: This was a big hit at the recent breakfast fundraiser.)
