SCCA March 9, 2016 Meeting Summary

President Pat Davidson called meeting to order at 7:05 pm. Manuel Grueser then swore in Alex Couladis as Treasurer for 2016. Ray Baker moved for approval of minutes as amended to include newsletter printing costs, Roberta Henderson seconded. Minutes approved.

Alex Couladis reported -\$12,814.97 as net income for February and checking account balance of \$15,870.88. Teresa Winning reported correspondence for the month included 1 sympathy card, 5 get well cards, 12 welcome letters to new members, 10 thank you's for donations, and 4 thank you's to businesses for Valentines donations. She reported a total of 175 members. Fran Moxley distributed the events calendars.

Jerry Foster reported that the water heater in the kitchen had been replaced; renovation of the women's restroom was complete; work on the men's restroom had begun.

Brenda Ruth Brenda said Barney Grueser would be presenting a program at the March 15th history meeting about restoring log cabins and barns. Jack Malloy reported that Mary Schreck would be presenting a program about suicide prevention to the Seniors the following evening.

New Business: Visitor Linda Gilden gave an update on the RSVP/COAD kids' summer feeding/activity program. Tammy Foster moved that the SCCA be a site again this year for this program; Heidi Marty seconded. Motion carried. Fran Moxley moved that the SCCA accept (not waive) the \$50 rental fee that was offered; Walter Jones seconded. Motion carried.

Gail Jordan proposed a possible layout for parking spaces on the outside basketball courts. Jerry Foster moved to remove two baskets, paint the remaining post near the gravel orange, and mark spaces; Teresa Winning seconded. Motion carried.

Old Business: Jerry Foster reported about 250 reservations and 300 meals served at the Valentines Dinner. Net income was \$1774.77. Fran Moxley described ideas for "Shade Community Market".

Fish fry is scheduled for Friday, April 15 from 4-7 pm. Tammy Foster reported 44 vendors had made reservations for the Spring Bazaar. Robin Krivesti announced that Easter Egg Hunt was scheduled for Sunday, March 20. Grace Dorst asked for volunteers to help at the upcoming Alumni Banquet.

Marvin Marty described plans for the Lost in Lodi enduro.

Walter Jones reported on the fire inspection. Range hood had been re-certified. Jerry Foster is ordering emergency lights and exit signs to be on-site prior to re-inspection the end of March.

There was a "unanimous motion" to adjourn at 8:57 p.m. 25 members attended (7 officers/board).

SCCA April 13, 2016 Meeting Summary

President Pat Davidson called the meeting to order at 7:07 pm. Fran moved for approval of minutes with correction of Laeek Mirza as from whom price for printing newsletters was obtained, Alex Couladis seconded. Minutes approved.

Alex Couladis reported -\$13,877.88 as net income for March and checking account balance of \$14,716.04. Teresa Winning reported correspondence for the month included 6 thank you notes, 4 sympathy cards, and 4 get well cards. She reported 22 new members, 34 renewals, and one lifetime membership received since the previous meeting, for a total of 233 members for the year to date (57 new members, 129 renewals and 47 life members). Donations received in excess of dues totaled \$270, including \$200 from Barbara Dougan Brake designated for a bench beside the walking path. Fran Moxley distributed the events calendars for April and May.

Jerry and Gail reported several maintenance items, including: completion of men's restroom, sale of scrap metal, parking spaces painted on outside courts, new fryer installed in kitchen, and need for repair of the walk-in cooler fuse box. Fire re-inspection visit was March 31. with progress noted and a follow-up visit to occur toward the end of May.

Brenda Ruth announced that Sonny Ruston would be presenting a program about the Barnhill and Ruston families at the April history meeting. George Benz reported the Seniors were serving the Trustees Dinner on April 20th.

New Business: Sammie Gaul described an exercise class to be offered at the Center on Monday evenings. Robin Krivesti moved to try this class for a few weeks, and also to investigate exercise equipment. Heidi seconded; motion passed.

Gail Jordan reported that he and Fran Moxley had completed the 2014 review, which was substantially in order. Debbie McAdoo, Teresa Winning, and Gail had begun the 2015 review.

Pat Davidson reported on the meeting which she and Alex had with the trustees to provide a financial report. The trustees are concerned about the parking on the outside basketball courts; parking there will be limited to events only. Pat was given a copy of RAFD's lease with drawings showing the boundaries.

Topic of long-terms rentals was tabled, although Brenda Ruth, Heidi Marty, and Pat Davidson indicated that they would like to serve on a committee if one were to be formed. Marvin Marty suggested that all "big stuff" which was personal property of individuals be labeled.

Old Business: Robin Krivesti reported that 96 kids attended the Easter Egg Hunt his year. Marsha Gwinn and family donated about 40 gift prize baskets, door prizes, and a raffle basket. The raffle brought in \$130 and kitchen donations were \$24.

Marvin Marty gave a brief report about the Lost in Lodi enduro. Once again address signs will be available, with sign-up at Lodi General Store. Fran Moxley gave the report of the Fundraiser Committee. Heidi Marty reported that carpet in the library had been cleaned and that move would begin in a couple weeks.

Walter moved to adjourn; Alex seconded. Meeting adjourned at 8:51 pm. 27 members attended (7 officers/board).

Summary of March 19, 2016**Executive Committee Meeting**

Executive committee members present were: Pat Davidson, Fran Moxley, Teresa Winning, Gail Jordan, Marvin Marty, and Norm Shaner. Items discussed are noted below.

Proposed gazebo/bandstand: Purpose would be to provide a permanent outside venue for uses such as the Jerseyville Festival, musical events, weddings, and birthday parties. Cost is unknown since the design has not been finalized. Regarding funding, even limited rental income is expected to exceed investment earnings on amount this would cost. This could be funded from the Coen bequest if approved by the designees; Fran suggested it be called the "Emogene Coen Gazebo", if so funded.

Various locations and alternatives were discussed. Design considerations included size, resin/composite construction, built on concrete pad, possible storage, solid rear wall, and whether project can be completed for under \$20,000. Marvin noted need for permission of the Lodi Township trustees, and Pat was to bring this up with the trustees when she attends their April meeting.

Repairs to third floor plaster, floors, etc.: Falling plaster from third floor ceiling must be repaired soon, per fire inspection. Pat will contact Rex Storer for estimate or referral regarding this as well as some plaster repairs in stairwells and around windows.

Press release for Shade Community Market: Fran plans to do this. The market is related to economic development of the area. Plan is to offer venue for local producers, home bakers and others. Space rentals are monthly. There are to be no weekly yard sales or flea markets.

maintenance committee has constructed this and placed it near the Richard F. Grim Field marker. Plates are being engraved to acknowledge this generous donation.

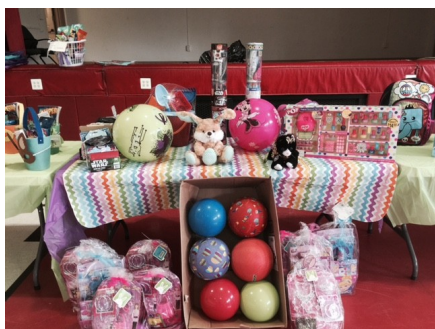

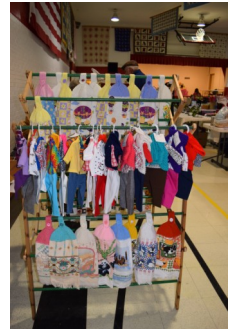

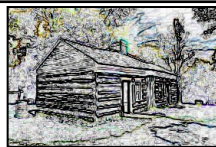

Saving Log Cabins and Barns



Forty people attended the March meeting of the Shade-Lodi History & Genealogy Association. Barney Grueser told how Antique American Log Cabins, a division of his construction company, recovers and restores old log cabins and hand-hewn timber-frame barns. Barney and his crew have dismantled and reconstructed many log houses in Ohio, as well as several other states, such as West Virginia, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and North Carolina.

Most log cabins in the eastern United States are really log houses, as they were built to be permanent residences, and the majority have two-stories. Barney

said that the good ones have center walls. He also said that application of siding is the best way to preserve them. They use synthetic chinking when reconstructing, because it sticks and seals much better than traditional chinking methods.

It was common to build log houses as two separate cabins with a breezeway, commonly called a dog trot between them. Often this area was closed in when these were converted to houses. Barney explained the main types of corner notches, as well as how they dismantle and reassemble the structures. Sometimes they can only salvage a few logs for use on other projects. Usually they do not salvage the stone from foundations, as it is often soft. They do save and reuse old hardware whenever they can.

The Shade-Lodi History and Genealogy Association generally meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m.

Usually meetings are held in the cafeteria of the Shade Community Center so attendees do not have to negotiate the stairs to the history room on the second floor.

Meetings are open to everyone whether interested in history, especially Lodi Township and surrounding area, or just interested in stories of the past.

The Barnhill/Ruston Family

Alfred T. (Sonny) Ruston of Jackson presented the Barnhill/Ruston genealogy at the April SLHGA meeting. He traced his roots to John Barnhill, who was a printer from Ireland who came to America in the 1600s as a stowaway, settled in Baltimore, then sent for his wife Elizabeth and four sons. Sonny's great great grandparents Robert and Mary Barnhill came to Harrison County Ohio in 1811, then later lived in Tuscarawas County. His great grandfather John was a carpenter and barn raiser, who married Margaret Sychs of Carthage Township on Dutch Ridge.

Sonny's grandfather Bura (1867-1963) married Magdalena "Lenie" Klingenberg (1868-1958). They farmed on Dutch Ridge and had three orchards, where they grew over thirty varieties of apples and cherries. He took the fruit to Athens by horse and wagon (later in a Dodge truck), an eighteen mile round trip, and sold it to grocers on Court Street. Bura and Lenie had nine children, many of whom attended Ohio University, and most of whom taught school. Sonny recalled several stories of his time on their farm, such as: witnessing the butchering of a pig and processing the sausage, working with the farm animals, learning planting and harvesting with his grandmother in her garden, and the origins of Barnhill Cemetery.

Sonny's parents were Ruby, a daughter of Bura and Lenie, and Alfred E. Ruston. They also were strong believers in the value of education. Sonny's paternal grandparents

were William (1862-1923) and Caroline Evans (1860-1948) Ruston, who married in England in 1881, emigrated to the U.S. and became naturalized citizens in 1893. William came to the Athens area from Coshocton; he was superintendent of brick plants in Buchtel, Nelsonville, Glouster and Athens. The Athens plant was behind the former Kasler Dairy.

Sonny's father Alfred started a motor repair

business in 1922 on Factory Street in Athens, but when coal mining began to decline, he moved the business to Jackson in 1935 to service brick plants in that area. At age 78, Sonny is still active in that business.

STERN MR. RUTH WAS TRUE EDUCATOR

The school year was 1952-1953 and I was a student in Gordon Ruth's sixth grade class at Shade Elementary School. Like hundreds of other sixth grade students under Mr. Ruth's tutelage over the years, I was educated with sternness and I was expected to behave.



Mr. Ruth had a way about him that demanded both good behavior and good study habits. He was not shy about assigning homework. It was in Mr. Ruth's class that I learned about Ohio's 88 counties. Not only were his students expected to memorize all 88 county names but the county seats as well and their location on the map! While I have forgotten much

of these facts, it is surprising what I do remember and it is all because of a teacher who demanded and expected learning.

Tuesday, June 2, 1953 marked the coronation of Queen Elizabeth and Mr. Ruth seized the opportunity to bring his black and white television set to school to share that event with his students. He also often carried his transistor radio to keep abreast of the major league baseball games. That was cutting edge technology back then.

2. Blend baking mix, milk, eggs, salt and pepper.
3. Stir in broccoli and cheese.
4. Coat a medium size (8x8) baking dish with cooking spray.
5. Bake at 325°F for 50-55 minutes.
6. Cut in squares and serve.
